2012 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

As time passes, it seems each year flies by faster than the last and we wonder what we've accomplished. Well, Rails to Trails of Central PA Inc. had some pretty substantial accomplishments this past year. We completed the Gap Feasibility Study, allowing us to proceed with the next steps in extending the trail to the Six thru Ten Trail in Juniata Township. We re-decked one of our very large bridges, repaired two of our drainage culverts, re-surfaced about four miles of trail, secured two more grants to re-deck another of the bridges and repair the flood damage washout at Water Street.

This past month, anyone using the trail noticed the new surface that was put down from Mt. Etna heading west to about Covedale. Once again we owe a great **THANK YOU** to **GRANNAS BROTHERS.** This area of the trail has been getting narrower and narrower and very soft and muddy. We had some funds for this project but not enough. In talking with Sam and Scott Grannas, they offered to donate their time and materials again to the re-surface the trail. So with our limited funds and their donation this section of trail is once again looking new.

These culverts were totally clogged, collapsing and causing potential severe damage to the trail during heavy rains. Pepple's Excavating of New Enterprise repaired the culverts at a cost of just under \$24,000, funded through the same DCNR grant.

Bells Gap Francis Campion Memorial Trail Hike:

On Sunday, October 28th, 18 people braved the early elements of Hurricane Sandy to honor past Juniata Valley Audubon member Staff Sgt. Francis Campion, who died in a military training accident in 2011, and who had hiked with us on this trail many times. The hike began at Lloydville at the top of the Allegheny Front and descended for six miles to the Bell's Gap Roots Trailhead.





WILDFLOWER WATCH: PERIWINKLE

We truly live in a global environment. Numerous plants and animals that were separated by the planet's oceans have spread through the world by mankind, mostly during the last four centuries. Unlike the FDA, which requires testing of new drugs and guards against possible food-generated health problems, there are few controls in place to test the effects of introduced plants and animals. In far too many cases, certain species have become invasive.

Periwinkle is, to a lesser extent, classified as invasive. This low growing plant, which is widely used as a ground cover by many gardeners, will grow in thick blankets and tends to Forest lands bordering residential crowd out weeds. neighborhoods may contain vast growths of the escaped Periwinkle. If gardeners fail to trim the edges of periwinkle beds or even toss trimmed pieces of the plant over the bank, an unwelcome invasion may begin. C oastal California has a major problem, but on the other hand, Periwinkle as a ground cover helps control the spread of wild fires.

The Vinca Major and Vinca Minor Periwinkle are generally used as ornamental cover. They remain green throughout the year which adds to their popularity. The leaves, which are ovate, are about one inch in length and grow in opposite patterns. The flowers, which seem to be ever present, are one to three inches long with five petals forming a single tube. The pastel blue "Periwinkle" blossoms have officially been listed as a color since 1922. The three to six foot stems of the plant will readily root when contacting the soil.

On the positive side of the scale, the Vinca genus has made major contributions to medical science. At least 86 alkaloids have been extracted from plants belonging to this family. Treatments for some leukemia, lymphomas, childhood cancers as well as other kinds of cancers and non-cancerous conditions have resulted from this family of plants.

There seems to be some natural control of the plant. The other day at work, I noticed a rabbit come out of the bushes and hop over a lawn full of clover to dine in a bed of Periwinkle. I saw him all week so he didn't suffer any apparent ill effects. To the life of me I wonder where they came up with the name. Thank goodness they saved the name Bullwinkle for future cartoons!


